Ganze constituency falls within Kilifi district. The District is one of 7 districts of the Coast province of Kenya.

1.2. Socio-Economic Profile

- Is the 2nd most densely populated district in the province;
- Has a primary school enrolment rate of 52.6%, ranking 5th in the province and 52nd nationally;
- Has a secondary school enrolment rate of 13.6%, ranking 3rd in the province and 48th nationally;
- Experiences the following main diseases: malaria, respiratory tract infections, skin disease and infections, intestinal worms and diarrhoea diseases;
- Has 85 of 1000 of its live babies dying before 1st birthday, being one of the highest in the province and ranking 32 of 44 of the nationally ranked districts;
- Has a life expectancy of 51 years, ranking 35th of 45 of the nationally ranked districts;
- Has a 32.5% malnourishment rate of children under 5 years of age, being one of the leading in the province and ranking 38th of 42 of the nationally ranked districts; and
- Is one of the poorest districts in Kenya: in terms of absolute poverty, it ranks 41 of all the districts. However, there are marginal improvement in this situation between 1994 and 1997.

Kilifi District is represented by 3 MPs who each on average cover an area of 1,593Km² and represent 1181,434 persons. During the 1997 elections, all the district's parliamentary seats were won by KANU.

2. CONSTITUENCY PROFILE

Ganze constituency comprises Vitengeni, Sokoke, Ganze, Kauma, Bamba, Mwachera and Ndigiria locations of Ganze division of Kilifi district.

2.2. Socio-Economic Profile

- The main economic activity in the constituency is agriculture.
- Cashew nut is the major cash crop.
- The price of cashew nut has declined substantially in recent years translating into extremely poor remuneration for farmers.
- There is a high absolute and food poverty levels in the constituency.
- There is a high level of malnutrition in the constituency.
- There is a high infant mortality rate in the constituency.
- There is a high rate of unemployment in the constituency.
- The constituency has a low primary and secondary school enrolment rates.

2.3. Electioneering and Political Activity

Ganze is the home of one of the founding fathers of post-independence Kenya, Ronald Ngala. Ngala was the President of the Kenya African Democratic Union (KADU) in the early 1960s. KADU was the second largest party after the Kenya African National Union (KANU). In 1964, however, KADU dissolved and Ngala and other senior party leaders joined KANU. Subsequently, he was appointed to a Cabinet position in the Kenyatta government, a position he retained until his death in a road accident in 1972. His son Noah Katana Ngala, as the Member of Parliament for Ganze, succeeded him. The younger Ngala was later elevated to a cabinet position, which he occupied to the end of Moi government. The Ngala family has completely dominated politics in Ganze constituency even after the reintroduction of multi-party system in Kenya. In 2002, the National Rainbow Coalition took the seat.

2.6. Main Problems

- The constituency is one of the least developed in the whole country.
- The main industry around Cashew nuts has largely collapsed due to a lack of a viable market. Cashew nut prices remain uneconomically low.
- The constituency does not have good roads.
- The constituency does not have adequate health facilities. There is only one hospital and one health center in the entire constituency. The existent facilities are in disrepair, overcrowded and also lack drugs and medical personnel.
- The constituency does not have adequate Schools. Primary and secondary school enrolment is very low.
- The constituency does not have adequate clean and safe drinking water.

3. CONSTITUTION MAKING/REVIEW PROCESS

3.1. Constituency Constitutional Forums (CCFs)

3.1.1. Philosophy

The Constituency Constitutional Forum (CCF) plays a very significant role in the review of the constitution. It is designated as one of the organs 'through which the review process shall be conducted' - (sec. 4(1) of the Constitution of Kenya Review Act, Cap.3A). The importance attached to the CCF arises from the recognition of the need to involve the people fully in the review of the constitution. Only through such participation of the public will the new constitution reflect the preferences, hopes and aspirations of the people. It would also increase people's knowledge of constitutional issues, and facilitate their familiarity with the provisions of the new constitution. Additionally, the process, enhances the legitimacy of the constitution among Kenyans and their sense of ownership over it. In these ways the proper implementation and safeguarding of the constitution will be facilitated.

3.1.2. **Composition and Establishment**

The 1997 Review Act had provided for district forums 'to mobilize communities at the local level for the purpose of civic education in preparation for the Commission's work and to perform such other duties as the Commission may assign' - (sec. 12A (6)). The District Forums were to consist of members elected to represent locations, religious organizations, and the disabled, in addition to MPs and members of every local authority in the district. The Act contained several provisions prescribing minimum qualifications for membership and regulating the operations of the District Forums.

The Select Committee of the National Assembly, which reviewed the Act in early 2000, decided to replace the District Forums with Constituency Forums to get views 'directly from the people in the constituency without necessarily going through the rigours of an election to determine the members of the forum'. It thought that this would provide for a more popular form of participation. It recommended on the simplification of the forum to avoid elections. The Select Committee envisaged the constituency forum as an 'open forum with no specific structures', which should be 'flexible and easy to manage'. Its opinion was that the 'existing leadership comprising Members of Parliament, councilors, community based organizations, religious groups and individuals should be able to present views and opinions directly from the grassroots' (*The Report of the Parliamentary Select Committee Reviewing the Constitution of Kenya Review Act, 1997*, April 2000). It removed the regulatory powers of the Commission over the forum, its role being confined to the 'facilitation' of the forum. It also changed the function of the forum from the facilitation of civic education to also include facilitation and the collection of the views of the public on proposals to alter the constitution.

In view of the limited role of the CKRC in the establishment of the CCF's, the CKRC prepared and gazetted Guidelines for the operationalization of the constituency constitutional forums. The Guidelines stipulated that all the residents of a constituency would constitute the CCF. The CCF is described as one of the organs 'through which the review process shall be conducted' - (sec.4(1)). The CCF was thus one of the principal ways in which the views of the public were to be obtained.

In order to coordinate and facilitate the activities of the CCF, a Constituency Constitutional Committee (CCC) was to be established. The Guidelines proposed its membership to consist of 10 persons, of which three would be ex-officio: the local MP, the chair of the County Council in which the constituency is located, and the District Coordinator. The Guidelines stated that the membership would be as broad and representative of the people of the constituency as possible and recommended that at least a third of the committee should be women.

3.1.3. **Functions of CCF**

- Facilitation of collection of the views of the public at the constituency level on proposals to alter the constitution; and
- Debate and discussion of the views of the members of the public on proposals to alter the constitution.

In performance of these functions, the CKRC was required to visit all constituencies (Sec.18 (1)(a)).

3.1.4. **Functions of CCC**

- The functions of the CCC were mainly facilitative and advisory, the primary aim being to enhance the effective participation in the ownership of the constitution review process by the people at the constituency level;
- The CCC was also mandated to promote, facilitate and monitor civic education at the constituency level in collaboration with the District Coordinator and civic education providers;
- Additionally, the CCC had to ensure that the constituency had access to all information relevant to the review process in coordination with District Documentation centers; and
- Finally, the CCC was also mandated with the task of dissemination of the report of the CKRC. It was to be assisted in this by the District Coordinator, who was also its accounting officer, in relation to funds that were made available to it by CKRC.

It is important to emphasize that the Guidelines were advisory, and the local community was free to modify them to suit local circumstances. For example, the size of the CCC could be increased when and if adequate representation and diversity required it.

3.1.5. **Date of Commencement of Work**

The Constituency Constitutional Forum (CCF) was to run for an initial period commencing November 2001 up to September 2002. Accordingly, each Constituency Constitutional Committee (CCC) should have been constituted at the very latest by the end of November 2001. The Constituency Constitutional Forum was to be operational by that time.

3.2. **District Coordinators**

3.2.1. **Mandate/Terms of Reference**

- Be the local grass root representative;
- Perform the generalization activities in the district;
- Be in charge of the documentation center/s in the district, facilitate its/their respective management, ensuring they are stocked and are easily accessible to the public and also organize their safety and security;
- Gathering any relevant local information and materials for the purpose of constitution making;
- Facilitate the identification, classification and organization of the physical and electronic retrieval and dissemination of information and materials for constitution making;
- Supply such information needed by local constituency forums and committees;
- Liaise with other documentation centers nearby and others for information;

- In collaboration with constituency committees, identify and arrange venues for public hearing whenever the CKRC visits the constituencies in their area;
- Facilitate regular meetings of the constituency committees and involve local people as much as possible in discussing constitutional issues;
- Source and identify other key personnel that the CKRC may wish to consult or engage in its work;
- Identify and arrange for simultaneous local translations, sign language users, procurement and hiring of public address systems, transport and communication facilities for CKRC's meetings in the district;
- Monitor the implementation of civic education by civic education providers in the district;
- Facilitate the formation of constituency committees with guidance and assistance of CKRC; and
- Perform any other tasks as directed by CKRC.

3.2.2. **Criteria for Appointment**

- Diversity in the composition, taking into account ethnicity, age, religion and professional or occupational background; and
- Appointees had at least attained Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education or its equivalent.

4. **CIVIC EDUCATION**

Civic Education in the constituency was carried out between 25th February, 2002 and 1st May, 2002.

4.1. **Phases and issues covered in Civic Education**

Stage one:- Is the only phase that was covered. This is the stage preceding the collection of views. This stage dealt with information, knowledge, skills and virtues that enabled Kenyans have an informed choice and present their views on constitutional review.

5.2. **Attendance Details**

A total of 342 presenters made substantive submissions to the Commission. Majority of the presenters were individuals making oral presentations.

5.3. **Concerns and Recommendations**

The following are the recommendations made by the presenters in Ganze. The recommendations were collated around 43 areas of concern, from the Preamble to National integrity/identity. Only areas where recommendations were made in the constituency are covered. The numbers in parentheses represent the number of times the recommendation (bulleted) was made, either orally or through written memoranda. Each count on a specific recommendation was picked from an individual, a group or an organization. Where a presenter made different recommendations on the same area of concern, each recommendation was counted separately. Where no number appears in parentheses, the recommendation was made only once.

5.3.1. **PREAMBLE**

- There should be a preamble in the constitution.(4)
- The preamble should acknowledge the history of the country. (2)

- The constitution provide that the government compensate individuals and organizations whose land was acquired illegally.(2)
- The new constitution should ensure social justice.
