Kabete constituency is situated in Kiambu District, Central Province.

### 1.2. Socio-Economic Profile

Kiambu District:

- Is the most populous and most densely populated district in Central province.
- Has low unemployment rate (8.84%) ranking it 20<sup>th</sup> in the Province.
- Has agriculture as the main economic activity.
- Has the lowest absolute poverty profile at 25% ranking it first in the country.
- Has the lowest food poverty profile at 24% ranking it first in the country.
- Has average primary school enrolments rate at 72.6%, ranking it 31<sup>st</sup> nationally.
- Has high secondary school enrolments rate at 43.5% ranking it third in the country.
- Has a low level of malnutrition at 15.7%, ranking it eighth nationally.
- Have 91% of the residents having access to safe sanitation.
- Have 68% of the residents having access to safe drinking water.
- Has upper respiratory tract infections, malaria, skin diseases and infections, ulcers, diarrhea diseases, intestinal worms as the main diseases.

Kiambu has the second largest average number of constituents per MP in Central Province - 148,802. The area's five Members of Parliament cover about 265 Km<sup>2</sup> each. The district voted on the basis of individual appeal rather than parties. In 1997, the district gave votes to all the major parties except KANU and FORD-K. Winners enjoyed diverse victory margins ranging from a few votes (1%) to 82%.

## 2. CONSTITUENCY PROFILE

Kabete, formerly know as Kikuyu, is made up of Kabete, Muguga, Nyathuna, Kikuyu, Karai, and Kinoo Divisions of Kiambu District.

### 2.2 Socio-Economic Profile

It is a constituency of contrast – having both fairly rich people and some of the poorest Kenyans living in the slums of Kinoo, Nyathuna and Karai. It has fertile land where coffee and tea are grown while other parts such as Karai and Kamango are semi-arid.

### 2.3 Electioneering and Political Activity

Since the introduction of a multi-party system in Kenya in 1991, the opposition parties have dominated the politics of the constituency. In 1992 the party of choice for the constituents was FORD-K while in 1997 it was SAFINA. In both of these parties, the candidate was one person, Paul Muite. SAFINA retained the seat in 2002.

- Inequality with a lot of wealth and poverty co-existing;
- Collapse of the coffee industry and related problems in the tea sector; and
- High levels of crime due to its proximity to Nairobi.

## 3. CONSTITUTION MAKING/REVIEW PROCESS

### 3.1. Constituency Constitutional Forums (CCFs)

#### 3.1.1. Philosophy

The Constituency Constitutional Forum (CCF) plays a very significant role in the review of the constitution. It is designated as one of the organs ‘through which the review process shall be conducted’ - (sec. 4(1) of the Constitution of Kenya Review Act, Cap.3A). The importance attached to the CCF arises from the recognition of the need to involve the people fully in the review of the constitution. Only through such participation of the public will the new constitution reflect the preferences, hopes and aspirations of the people. It would also increase people’s knowledge of constitutional issues, and facilitate their familiarity with the provisions of the new constitution. Additionally, the process, enhances the legitimacy of the constitution

among Kenyans and their sense of ownership over it. In these ways the proper implementation and safeguarding of the constitution will be facilitated.

### 3.1.2. **Composition and Establishment**

The 1997 Review Act had provided for district forums ‘to mobilize communities at the local level for the purpose of civic education in preparation for the Commission’s work and to perform such other duties as the Commission may assign’ - (sec. 12A (6)). The District Forums were to consist of members elected to represent locations, religious organizations, and the disabled, in addition to MPs and members of every local authority in the district. The Act contained several provisions prescribing minimum qualifications for membership and regulating the operations of the District Forums.

The Select Committee of the National Assembly, which reviewed the Act in early 2000, decided to replace the District Forums with Constituency Forums to get views ‘directly from the people in the constituency without necessarily going through the rigours of an election to determine the members of the forum’. It thought that this would provide for a more popular form of participation. It recommended on the simplification of the forum to avoid elections. The Select Committee envisaged the constituency forum as an ‘open forum with no specific structures’, which should be ‘flexible and easy to manage’. Its opinion was that the ‘existing leadership comprising Members of Parliament, councilors, community based organizations, religious groups and individuals should be able to present views and opinions directly from the grassroots’ (*The Report of the Parliamentary Select Committee Reviewing the Constitution of Kenya Review Act, 1997*, April 2000). It removed the regulatory powers of the Commission over the forum, its role being confined to the ‘facilitation’ of the forum. It also changed the function of the forum from the facilitation of civic education to also include facilitation and the collection of the views of the public on proposals to alter the constitution.

In view of the limited role of the CKRC in the establishment of the CCF’s, the CKRC prepared and gazetted Guidelines for the operationalization of the constituency constitutional forums. The Guidelines stipulated that all the residents of a constituency would constitute the CCF. The CCF is described as one of the organs ‘through which the review process shall be conducted’ - (sec.4(1)). The CCF was thus one of the principal ways in which the views of the public were to be obtained.

In order to coordinate and facilitate the activities of the CCF, a Constituency Constitutional Committee (CCC) was to be established. The Guidelines proposed its membership to consist of 10 persons, of which three would be ex-officio: the local MP, the chair of the County Council in which the constituency is located, and the District Coordinator. The Guidelines stated that the membership would be as broad and representative of the people of the constituency as possible and recommended that at least a third of the committee should be women.

### 3.1.3. **Functions of CCF**

- Facilitation of collection of the views of the public at the constituency level on proposals to alter the constitution; and
- Debate and discussion of the views of the members of the public on proposals to alter the constitution.

In performance of these functions, the CKRC was required to visit all constituencies (Sec.18 (1)(a)).

#### **3.1.4. Functions of CCC**

- The functions of the CCC were mainly facilitative and advisory, the primary aim being to enhance the effective participation in the ownership of the constitution review process by the people at the constituency level;
- The CCC was also mandated to promote, facilitate and monitor civic education at the constituency level in collaboration with the District Coordinator and civic education providers;
- Additionally, the CCC had to ensure that the constituency had access to all information relevant to the review process in coordination with District Documentation centers; and
- Finally, the CCC was also mandated with the task of dissemination of the report of the CKRC. It was to be assisted in this by the District Coordinator, who was also its accounting officer, in relation to funds that were made available to it by CKRC.

It is important to emphasize that the Guidelines were advisory, and the local community was free to modify them to suit local circumstances. For example, the size of the CCC could be increased when and if adequate representation and diversity required it.

#### **3.1.5. Date of Commencement of Work**

The Constituency Constitutional Forum (CCF) was to run for an initial period commencing November 2001 up to September 2002. Accordingly, each Constituency Constitutional Committee (CCC) should have been constituted at the very latest by the end of November 2001. The Constituency Constitutional Forum was to be operational by that time.

### **3.2. District Coordinators**

#### **3.2.1. Mandate/Terms of Reference**

- Be the local grass root representative;
- Perform the generalization activities in the district;
- Be in charge of the documentation center/s in the district, facilitate its/their respective management, ensuring they are stocked and are easily accessible to the public and also organize their safety and security;
- Gathering any relevant local information and materials for the purpose of constitution making;
- Facilitate the identification, classification and organization of the physical and electronic retrieval and dissemination of information and materials for constitution making;
- Supply such information needed by local constituency forums and committees;
- Liaise with other documentation centers nearby and others for information;
- In collaboration with constituency committees, identify and arrange venues for public hearing whenever the CKRC visits the constituencies in their area;
- Facilitate regular meetings of the constituency committees and involve local people as much as possible in discussing constitutional issues;
- Source and identify other key personnel that the CKRC may wish to consult or engage in its work;

- Identify and arrange for simultaneous local translations, sign language users, procurement and hiring of public address systems, transport and communication facilities for CKRC's meetings in the district;
- Monitor the implementation of civic education by civic education providers in the district;
- Facilitate the formation of constituency committees with guidance and assistance of CKRC; and
- Perform any other tasks as directed by CKRC.

### 3.2.2. **Criteria for Appointment**

- Diversity in the composition, taking into account ethnicity, age, religion and professional or occupational background; and
- Appointees had at least attained Kenya Certificate of Secondary Education or its equivalent.

## 4. **CIVIC EDUCATION**

Civic education was carried out in the constituency between 11th of February 2002 and 15th of April 2002.

### 4.1. **Phases covered in Civic Education**

Stage 1 - Is the only phase that has adequately been covered. This is the stage preceding the collection of views. This stage dealt with information, knowledge, skills and virtues that enabled Kenyans to make informed choices and present their views on constitutional review.

5.3. **Concerns and Recommendations**

The following are the recommendations made by the presenters in Kabete Constituency. The recommendations were collated around 43 areas of concern, from the Preamble to National integrity/identity. Only areas where recommendations were made in the constituency are covered. The numbers in parentheses represent the number of times the recommendation (bulleted) was made, either orally or through written memoranda. Each count on a specific recommendation was picked from an individual, a group or an organization. Where a presenter

made different recommendations on the same area of concern, each recommendation was counted separately. Where no number appears in parentheses, the recommendation was made only once.

### 5.3.1. **PREAMBLE TO THE CONSTITUTION**

- There should be a preamble in the constitution. (11)

The preamble should:

- Advocate for human rights. (1)
- Express the vision of Kenyans.
- Include a statement that the constitution belongs to the people of Kenya.
- Indicate that the constitution belongs to the people of Kenya in agreement, hopes and just society for all.
- Reflect that we will recognize, recall, exercise and be committed to our constitution.

### 5.3.2. **DIRECTIVE PRINCIPLES OF STATE POLICY**

- We need statements in our constitution capturing the national philosophy and guiding principles. (4)
- The Constitution should provide for gender equality as basic principle
- The Kenya philosophy of peace, love and unity should be included in the constitution. (2)
- Kenya should be a sovereign and democratic republic. (3)
- The constitution should provide that working together philosophy should replace harambee, which has been abused and corrupted.
- The constitution should provide for the independence of the three arms of the government.

### 5.3.3. **CONSTITUTIONAL SUPREMACY.**

- The procedure for amendment of the constitution by 65% majority vote should be retained. (2)
- The constitution should be amended by 75 % of the majority votes in parliament.

- The constitution should provide for its supremacy over all other laws in the country. (2)

- Provide that the prime minister and his cabinet should have powers to invoke emergency powers.
- Permit the use of extra ordinary powers in emergency situations such as war, national disaster and breakdown of public order. (4)

- Provide that the authority to invoke emergency powers should be entirely on parliament.
- Provide that Parliament should not have a role in effecting the emergency powers. (2)

On financing of Political Parties, provide:

- That the government finance political parties. (8)
- That the political parties should be financed from public funds. (6)
- That the government fund political parties if they attain 10% of parliamentary seats.
- The political parties should not be financed by the state.
- That the government funds all political parties during campaigns.
- That the political parties should finance themselves. (5)
- That the political parties should be transparent and accountable to the members in order to be financed.
- For the formation of an independent body to monitor the terms and conditions of financing the political parties.

Limit the number of political parties:

- To two.
- To three. (6)
- To five.
- Do not limit the number of political parties.

The constitution should:

- Provide for a parliamentary system of government with a ceremonial president and an independent prime minister. (11)

- Provide for a Majimbo system of government. (3)

- Provide for the equipping of all public health facilities.
- Provide for the upgrading of all district hospitals into referral hospital.
- Restrain Kenyans from keeping money abroad.
- Provide that civic education be taught in schools and colleges.
- Provide farmers with the freedom to market their produce through their own channels.
- Provide for the review of the education system in order to enhance the quality of the education provided.
- Give teachers the mandate to review the education system.
- Provide for a ban on old and un-road worthy vehicles.
- Provide for encouragement of irrigation farming.
- Ban mob justice.
- Provide for the maintenance of harambees.

### 5.3.27. **STATUTORY LAW**

The constitution should:

- Provide for the reinstatement of local brews.
- Prohibit the manufacture and consumption of all local brews.

- Prohibit the manufacture and consumption of cigarettes.
- Provide for the enactment of a law against rape.
- Provide for a law to deal with land grabbers.
- Ensure the there be equality between men and women regarding the position of Muslim women.

#### 5.3.28. **NATURAL JUSTICE / RULE OF LAW**

- Provide that the law should apply in a non-discriminatory manner to all Kenyans.
- Provide for prosecution of inciters of land clashes.

#### 5.3.29. **NATIONAL INTEGRITY /IDENTITY**

- Kenya should have a common national dress.
- Kenyan flag should be our identity.
