Cedric Thornberry, an international lawyer who comes from Belfast in Ireland, has in recent decades defended human rights in many crisis situations throughout the world - as a founder of the Northern Ireland civil rights movement in the 60s; in the European Court of Human Rights in the 70s; reporting for The Guardian from Athens during the Greek military dictatorship; working to establish free and fair elections in the Caucasus countries; organising the lifting of sieges in Sarajevo and Mostar; negotiating democratic elections in Cambodia (where he convened the first-ever public debate between its political leaders). He is also an experienced peacekeeper, who has mediated cease-fires and humanitarian initiatives in more than a dozen warring countries, and has helped train senior officers for NATO peacekeeping. Joining the UN in 1978 to help plan and negotiate Namibian independence, he became Chief Aide to Martti Ahtissari, the UN's Special Representative there. Later, as an international consultant, he has been a professor of peace studies in Derry and defence studies in London. He has an honorary doctorate from the British-based Open University and is an honorary fellow of the London School of Economics and Political Science. He has six grown-up children and lives (mostly) in Cyprus.
